President's Report

Hi, It's the shortest day in one week. I am keeping close to the log fire, with my only fishing experience being watching YouTube during lunch, to keep tabs on what flies have been working (there are no new flies, just flies with new names), or what lakes are firing. Lake Selfe is producing the goods for those fishing during the evening. I have also seen photos of salmon being caught off the beach at Kaikoura twice in one week. This is the earliest that most of those in the know are saying they have seen salmon being caught from behind the railway station, and its warmer on the beach during the day, than night fishing our High Country or the canals, with a café and a craft beer brewery close by... Last month's club night was well attended, with 35 plus members coming to listen to ECan ecologist Tina Beyer bring us up to date with the state of the water quality at the Ashburton Lakes. Tina's delivery was simple to understand and to the point, and it left no doubt about the current water quality in the lakes close by our lodge, and the likely causes for the changes. Thankfully, human waste run-off from Lake Clearwater village is only a tiny part of the overall cause, and as a club we were pioneers with putting in a holding tank. While Tina admitted to not being a betting woman, she did think there is a fishing future for the Ashburton Lakes. Things look positive for Clearwater, but not as rosy for Lake Heron, or some of the smaller lakes in the area. As one of our team said earlier this year – if you want to fish Lake Heron, and experience the excellent fishing it was known for, get up there on opening day as water quality does look like it will diminish across the next season, before it gets better.

We have a bit of a gap in the club event calendar coming up. Our next club trip arranged is in September at Kaikoura, based at the Canterbury Underwater Club. Before that we have an invite to a genuine Brass Monkey event at Lake Coleridge on the first weekend in August – the weekend that this event has been held, in past years. With the added bonus of accommodation at the Harper end, this looks to be easy to get to, with some good fishing options for shore and boat fisher peeps alike. Our first event of the new season will be the Richard Marles challenge – this year with added significance since Richard's passing.

Duvauchelle Flounder Fishing Weekend 19th—21st May 2023

Pete Collins has done a great job in growing this trip into a well-supported event. 17 members and friends, with their variety of craft, descended on the Duvauchelle Holiday Park and Tikao Bay with high hopes of netting a feed or two of tasty flat fish.

We had heard the Little River Hotel was under new ownership and had completed a significant upgrade and therefore worthy of inspection, so we included a "Friday Lunch" into the weekends schedule. The ambiance, food and warmth simply blew us away such

that this will be our go to place whenever the opportunity arises.

Analysing data on Apps "Windy" & "Swellmap" we were not convinced we'd need fishing rods as a southerly blast with swells building to 4m by Sunday morning were forecast for the Akaroa Heads and we'd definitely need wet weather gear. Weatherwise the weekend played out as predicted with still conditions Friday night / Saturday morning, a breeze and drizzle Saturday evening and the 30 Knot Southerly and rain Sunday morning which made retrieving nets challenging, including a float rope wrapped around Reelbusy's prop. Speaking of challenges let's not forget the campervans trying to exit sodden grass parking spaces, some agriculture restoration will be required by the holiday park staff. Pete, a wise call to go a day earlier and pull the net Saturday evening thus avoiding the inevitable drenching a ride in the rubber ducky would have produced on Sunday morning!



The down side and sometimes controversial consequence of net fishing is "bycatch".

On Saturday evening whilst boating near the southern tip of Ngai Tahu's historic fortified Onawe Peninsula we spotted a Hectors Dolphins, which sent a shiver down our spines and prompted us to relocate our net to very shallow water in Barry's Bay. The unusual sighting this far inshore during May begs the questions; Was it sick or did it have more confidence due to the extremely high tide, which may have been associated with the recent tsunami warning. The tide was so high it limited vehicle manoeuvrability at the Duvauchelle boat ramp. Our catch included a couple of seaweed species, Rock Oyster encrusted debris, Starfish, pesky crabs, manky Red Cod, Yellow Eyed Mullet, Spiny Dogfish, Skate and a salmon - unfortunately dead. Here's the thing; why do the current rules dictate that you throw back the salmon, which was clearly cage reared, to further nourish the thriving sea lice population? Garry, was that really an XXOS flounder or was it a small skate?

The good thing about a floundering trip is that outside the dawn and dusk net related activities the rest of the time is available for chillaxing, chewing the fat with mates, socialising or just doing whatever you choose to do. This weekend incorporated a pot luck dinner on Friday with a great selection of tucker including a "self-saucing chocolate sponge pudding"- yummy! Thanks Dave Sherrif. A meal & rugby at the Duvauchelle's Hotel rounded off a great Saturday.

A good weekend was had by all - everyone got plenty of flounders which shows that the fishery is in good health.

Some North Canterbury Fish and Game news clips -

- * Rivers with a lot of fishing pressure have been assigned as 'Designated Waters'. They are currently the Hope River involving all waters above State Highway 7 Road Bridge and the Upper Waiau waters above the confluence with the Hope, with the exception of Lake Guyon.
- * A beat system for these pressured rivers will be funded by the NZ Council. Residents licences will be \$5 annually, whereas overseas visitors (non residents) will pay \$40 per day with 5 days maximum per region.
- * A local junior winter fishery Lake Roto Kohatu will be available for next season. The lake is very busy with many diverse users in summer including swimmers. Another sustainable pond near Christchurch is still wanted. Any ideas and suggestions please let me know.
- * The sea run salmon bag for 2023/24 will be set when the final combined return estimates are in for the Waimakariri, Rakaia and Rangitata rivers in late June. Indicators are not as promising as hoped.
- * The Glenariffe Wetland and Waterways project that forms an extended and protected area for salmon and trout spawning will be called the McIntyre Wetland, in recognition of his contributions.
- * Following submissions, four lakes in Canterbury will remain fly fishing only given the special experience that this angling craft can offer. Lake Monk (Catherine) will be open to all methods.
- * The Rakaia River Water Conservation Order is before the Environment Court. In short, ECan the regulator has failed to regulate the Rakaia and Lake Coleridge waters. And it is asking the court if it should have...... refer to article in Stuff.

Bill Bennett undertook the task of securing accommodation at a new location in Otematata for this annual trip following the closure of the old lodge where members had stayed for some years.

Our hosts were Rob and Anita Armstrong who operate Valley Lodge and manage other Air B&B properties in Otematata. The lodge was purpose built as a fishing lodge however our group was the first group of fisherpersons that they had hosted.

On Saturday evening everybody gathered at Valley Lodge where our hosts provided a splendid two course dinner and everyone enjoyed the fellowship of the occasion.

Sunday morning saw most boats heading to Lake Aviemore and spreading around the Lake. Water conditions were good until a southerly change came through about midday. This change in conditions probably provided the best fishing of the weekend, however this only lasted for a short period and the temperature dropped considerably. Weigh in was at 4.00pm each day and most boats were off the water by then.

The prize giving was held at the Otematata Club. Ferrymead Fishing Club did take part in the competition this year and numbers from Woolston and Papanui were less than usual.

Liz McDowell collected top prize for the heaviest fish and Pete Collins for the most fish. CAC again took home the Brass Monkey Shield competed for between Woolston and CAC for the highest average number of fish per rod.

Environment Court News Brief

The decision for the NZFFA to attend the Environment Court where the Environment Canterbury Regional Council (Ecan) is seeking a Declaration that Ecan is not accountable for monitoring and enforcing the Rakaia River NWCO 1988, as an interested party under S 274 of the Resource Management Act 1991, is the defining decision of the past year.

Four years ago the NZFFA decided to make water quality and quantity in the Canterbury Region the focus of the Federation's advocacy. This was not a parochial decision, simply a recognition that this region has the most polluted and most over allocated freshwater of any region in New Zealand. Ecan's poor decision making, inadequate regulations, monitoring and enforcement provides lessons other regions of New Zealand can learn from.

Things have begun to unravel badly for Ecan;

- Wilco Terink's leaked report identified a lack of compliance with Rakaia River irrigation consents which Ecan appears unable to monitor and enforce
- Manawa Energy's (Trustpower's) attempt to store "virtual water" in Lake Coleridge for later sale to Central Plains Water has not been challenged by Ecan.
- Diffuse nitrate pollution of region's aquifers from intensive farming continues unchecked.
- The near extinction of Stokell's smelt from Canterbury's braided river mouths including the Rakaia River is a national embarassment.
- The latest, (August 2020), NPS FM standards, (nitrate "bottom line" of 2.4 mg/L NO3-N), and the NPS NES standards, (winter grazing) have made Ecan's \$40 million Land and Water Regional Plan (LWRP) redundant.
- A damming MfE report on the pollution of the Ashburton Gorge Lakes "Lessons Learned" reflects poorly on Ecan's planning and policies.
- The Environment Defence League's (EDL) challenge of Ecan's non notified irrigation consents is before the Environment Court

It seems the legacy of the Environment Canterbury (Temporary Commissioners) and Improved Water Management Act 2010, (Ecan Act), including the non notified & non statutory Canterbury Water Management Strategy (CWMS) and a decade of government appointed commissioners is coming home to roost

Ecan's chief scientist's models, evasions, deceit, and deferrals, together with the "managed/politicized reporting" initiated by Ecan's senior managers has created a mess that Ecan no longer wants to acknowledge.

By seeking a Declaration that Ecan is not accountable for the region's NWCOs it appears Ecan is attempting to tidy a mess of its own making by distancing itself from the problem through a Declaration in the Environment Court

If any of the NWCOs across New Zealand are to continue to have any value in protecting outstanding waterways, it is essential that Regional Councils such as Ecan are held to account.

This is a national issue!

This will commit much of the Federation's reserves towards legal costs and will require further active fund raising. David Haynes and other executive members have already made generous donations towards these costs. David has been central to driving this case and interaction with James Gardner-Hopkins and his legal team.

The NZFFA and NZ Salmon Anglers are both working to support Fish & Game as interested parties. The NZFFA and NZ Salmon Anglers may have to combine forces to defray expenses, but both of us feel it is important to remain independent of F&G.

This is an important project to see through for the sake of all New Zealand anglers.

Trout Fishing - Once Hooked, There's No Escaping!

All sorts of people go trout fishing. Among them have been or are the famous. Among New Zealanders, property developer Bob Jones, golfer Greg Turner and his brother, noted poet Brian Turner, Kiri te Kanawa, Sam Neill and quite a few others. In the past US crooner Bing Crosby secretly slipped into New Zealand year after year to go trout fishing while world leaders from US presidents Jimmy Carter and Dwight Eisenhower have been avid fly fishermen.

British royalty have fished New Zealand rivers such as the Tongariro River while sporting legends such as golfer Jack Nickalus have fished South Island rivers. Hollywood actors not infrequently, are keen trout fishermen.

In New Zealand anyone can go trout fishing as long as the annual licence fee is paid, unlike other countries where a fee for the right to fish is often paid to landowners adjoining rivers. It is truly a public sport.

The public ownership of New Zealand fish and game sport is no accident. Such a system was set in place by the early European settlers who sought to escape the feudal structure of the UK where the best fishing by dint of income and wealth, is the preserve of those who can afford the high fishing-shooting-hunting rights charges and access fees.

New Zealanders have guarded and cherished this unique egalitarian foundation and principle for over a century. It's written into law that thou shalt not charge for the right to fish for trout.

Summer is the favoured time for trout fishing, outside of the Rotorua-Taupo areas, where trout fishing during the cooler months is often better.

Why do people fish? Is it a form of escaping from work and business stress?

Undoubtedly it is a therapy - a way to unwind and relax. It's about physical exercise, being outdoors, going with the flow and "just being there." I picked up a fridge magnet on a visit to Alaska and its words capture to a good degree about just being there on the river. Titled "Advice from a River", it ran "go with the flow, go around obstacles, slow down and meander, stay current - the beauty is in the journey."

Then again, I've always liked the reasons given in US novelist Robert Traver's writings. He wrote in "Trout Magic" in 1974:-

"I fish because I love to; because I love the environs where trout are found, which are invariably beautiful and hate the environs where crowds of people are found, which are invariably ugly; because of all the television commercials, cocktail parties and assorted social posturing I thus escape; because in a world where most men seem to spend their lives doing things they hate, my fishing is at once an endless source of delight, and an act of small rebellion.....

Because fish do not lie or cheat and cannot be bought or bribed or impressed by power but respond only to quietude, humility and patience; because I suspect that men are going along this way for the last time and I for one, don't want to waste the trip; because mercifully there are no telephones on trout waters; because only in the woods can I find solitude without loneliness, because bourbon out of an old tin cup always tastes better out there; because one day I will catch a mermaid; and finally not because I regard fishing as being so terribly important but because I suspect that so many of the other concerns of men are equally unimportant ---- and not nearly so much fun."

One beauty about trout fishing is that it is a lifelong sport. Youngsters can fish as soon as they can walk and run. And I knew of one fly fisher in Nelson who at 97 years of age, went to his beloved stretch on the Motueka River to fish.

Women are often especially skilled fly fishers for trout with their finesse and delicacy.

So if you haven't trout fished but have always wondered about it, contact your local fish and game office or community information office to see if there's a local trout fishing club.

That's the best way to learn. Rub shoulders and go fishing with a "gun". And there's a multitude of trout fishing books to pore over.

And trout fishing need not be an expensive sport. You can buy fly rods costing over \$1,000 but it's not vital to enjoying the sport. Some years ago I knew a very successful fly fisher who used a rod made by Rotorua's Kilwell rod makers that was marketed as a boy's rod. It was an inexpensive blue fibre glass rod called the Robin Hood. Now Jim fished with that season after season, taking 300 to 400 trout from Nelson Rivers until one day it broke in two while he was battling a big brown trout on the Buller River!

While there's winter fishing, the next full trout fishing season starts on October 1. This is an excerpt from the NZFFA May 2023 Newsletter

Recipe Corner

Barbecued Rainbow Trout

Just thought that a Kiwi Barbeque recipe for some of your recently caught Rainbow Trout would be good.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 x 560g (1-pound) whole rainbow trout
- 1/2 cup (125ml) lime juice
- 2 tablespoon white wine
- 2 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 tablespoon honey
- 1 tablespoon dry mustard
- 4 clove garlic, crushed
- 2 shallots (50g), chopped finely
- 1 teaspoon sea salt flakes
- 1/2 teaspoon cracked black pepper

Place fish on board; score fish both sides through thickest part of flesh.

Combine juice, wine, oil, honey, mustard, garlic, shallots, salt and pepper in medium jug. Pour marinade over fish in large shallow dish. Cover; refrigerate 2 hours.

Cook fish on heated oiled barbecue flat plate 10 minutes; turn, cook further 10 minutes or until cooked through.

Long term = by arrangement with the Committee.

Hut Rules

- 1. Huts may only be booked by financial members of the club.
- 2. Bookings may be made, no more than 90 days in advance.
- 3. The Club member who makes the booking must be in residence when the hut is used and is responsible for the behavior of guests and any damage, should any occur.
- 4. Only one hut booking can be made at any one time.
- 5. Any damage must be reported immediately.
- 6. Empty gas bottles must be returned to the booking convener for refilling.
- 7. At peak times Christmas to 15th January and all long weekends hut bookings shall be considered exclusive, but will be subject to a ballot if more than one party wants to book. The ballot shall be held 60 days prior to the occupancy date.
- 8. Through the balance of the year bookings shall be on a first come basis.
- 9. Bookings can only be for a maximum of seven days.
- 10. All hut users to take note of specific instructions on the safe use of equipment in the huts as detailed in the manuals provided in each facility.
- 11. Intentions books are placed in each hut, please use them, it may save a life.
- 12. If the lawns need mowing when you are staying at any of our lodges, it is expected that you mow them. Fuel cost for the mower will be reimbursed. The reward for mowing them is that you can shout yourself a beer when they are done.
